

I received an email from my growing-up pastor not too long ago. He's retired, enjoying his grandkids and whatever traveling he can fit in. Occasionally, he writes a devotional and sends it out. They are always delightful and challenging at the same time. This email came one early morning, asking if I had an amazon account. I thought perhaps he had written a book and wanted to let me know how to get one. Instead, he said that he was having problems with his bank and needed to send some gift cards over the internet to a friend whose birthday was that day. He wanted me to buy them and send them on his behalf. He wanted to be \$200 generous with this birthday gift as well. Translation? Someone hacked his account. Someone figured out his password, stole his account, and was now sending out emails to scam his friends and colleagues.

I don't know if we pastors are being targeted or as a profession we are too trusting with easy passwords. He's the 5th pastor that month that I have received such a request from. One pastor (whom I know to be in a nursing home right now) "emailed" me, telling me he was in jail in Italy and needed bail money. I can't tell you how many overseas princes or orphanages I could help while getting thousands of dollars for myself if I just sent up front money, too. If they

So before I go any further here, just for future reference: I will <u>never</u> ask for money or something like it for any reason in an email, in a text message, or even in a phone call. With artificial intelligence growing at exponential rates and with deep fake creations, it might even sound like me. If I'm asking for money or gift cards or anything like it, its not me. The church has always been generous to my care and if I ended up with a need, it would be most ethical to take that need to the Deacons, not to individuals in the church. That even includes missions type giving or specific needs within the church. Never unsolicited to an individual for church purposes and never ever ever would I approach an individual congregant to help meet a personal financial need of mine.

were real, I'd be a millionaire in an afternoon.

But why am I really telling you this? Because I believe that as things like inflation continue to rise and hope and morality continue to dwindle, scammers like this will increase. And this can even include people we know and love—trying to hold our relationship hostage, demanding money and resources because, "Grandma, this next thing is going to be what sets me up." Or "Grandpa, If I don't get this money, I'm going to jail." Or "Dad/Mom, if you love me, you'll tap into your retirement and help me out here." We, as believers, are called to be generous. We care called to give sacrificially. We are called to love one another as Christ loves the church. What do we do with people who claim need but really just don't want to work? And before I go too far there, there are people who claim to need help *and really need it, too.* We are not to judge. We are to be discerning, though.

How do we do that, though?

I think the first thing is to identify the genuine need. The most important need that every single human being has is a need for a personal relationship with God. A person can go around 3 weeks without food. Three days without water. Around three weeks minutes without air. But they can't spend a single eternal second in Heaven without Christ. Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth, the life. No one comes unto the Father except through me. (John 14:6)"

Sometimes God sets up some pretty tough circumstances to get people to a place where they can only turn to Him. When we jump in and "rescue" them, we can get in God's way. No one wants to see someone suffer. But it is often in our suffering when we see our need for God the clearest. So question #1 is this: Is my help here going to impede this person's relationship with God? If they are scamming you, the answer is automatically "Yes, it's going to get in the way." If they are guilting you, the answer is automatically, "Yes, it is going to get in the way."

Question #2 is this: Have I prayed about it? I am reminded of Joshua in the Old Testament—Joshua 9, to be exact. The Gibeonite people tricked Joshua into believing they were a people far, far away. They looked like they were telling the truth. They sounded the part. Everything checked out, except Joshua and the leadership didn't check it out with God. The result was that the people who were supposed to be far, far away were in the next town and escaped God's judgment because Joshua thought he didn't need God to make this decision. Pray about it. If someone doesn't give you the time to pray about it for a couple of days, it's not a good sign.

One passage I use to pray through frequently when I get stuck on what God wants me to do is James 3:17. I walk myself down the list in prayer asking, is what I am being asked to do pure, peace-loving, considerate, submissive, full of mercy and good fruit, impartial and sincere? But I also must remind myself that I am not God sent to solve people's problems. I am an ambassador that serves *the God who could solve their problems* and God can say, "No." He told Paul "No" when Paul asked to be released from his thorn. Jesus told Peter, "No" when he tried to take on the Jewish Temple guards with a fish scaler.



The Father even told Jesus "No" when He asked for the cup of his death to pass him by. When it comes from God, "No" is a complete and godly sentence. Nothing to be ashamed of, regardless of whatever fall out might happen next. It's OK to say, "No" when it's the right answer.

Question #3 is this: Have I sought godly counsel on this? The second wisest man ever to walk the planet once wrote, "A cord of three strands is not easily broken. (Ecclesiastes 4:12)" King Solomon was referring to the need to get wise counsel before making a decision. He also said, "With many counselors, there is victory. (Proverbs 11:14, 15:22)" What often happens with people who are trying to scam you is that they make it an emergency that has to be solved yesterday. That's just plain manipulation. There are actually very few problems that cannot wait until tomorrow, especially when there are sizable sums of money involved. As a pastor, I see many people from the community come into my office wanting me to help them with their utilities or rent. They hand me a service-disconnection notice or an eviction notice, usually dated a month previous. They attempt to create a crisis that makes me feel like I have to solve right there. That crisis can cloud wisdom in action. The question becomes, "How fast can I fix this?" rather than "Is this God's will?" The switching of questions will throw you off course every time. Telling them I need to talk with some people and will get back to them in a day or two doesn't make them happy, but the ones in genuine crisis will understand. Know this: The deacons and I can be that counsel if you need someone to bounce something off of. An outside godly voice is important here.

For those who might seek to take advantage of us, we need to keep reminding ourselves that they are slaves of the evil one, or at least influenced by him. They are to be prayed for, not people to hate (John 8:44, 2 Corinthians 4:4). I'm not saying you have to engage them. Don't continue the conversation with them, but maybe start a conversation *about* them with Someone else. What I am saying is at least pray for them. You cannot fix them. You cannot save them. But God can. Pray for them. Forgive them. Stick to your boundaries, but don't let their attempt to use you plant a seed of bitterness. Don't buy into the lie that you have to give them what they want so that eventually you can reach them. God has a wonderful plan for them. If He can turn Saul the persecutor into Paul the missionary, He can do the same for them. Pray for that outcome.

And finally, don't let such attempts dampen your hope. Don't let it callous your generosity. God has blessed us to bless others. Remind yourself when someone attacks, that "Greater is He that is in you than he that is in the world. (1 John 4:4)" Remind yourself that you are more than a conqueror through Him who loves you so. (Romans 8:37) Yes, our broken world is falling apart, but this isn't our world. We have a citizenship elsewhere. And we have a God who will carry us through to that point. This is just a "light and momentary trouble that is achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all. (2 Cor 4:17)"
